












Painted buntings visit Florida throughout the fall and winter months and begin to return north in the spring. An adult male painted bunting is arguably the most distinctive songbird in North America, with the combination of a deep blue head, red underparts, a green back, and a red rump. While not as brightly colored as males, female painted buntings are also distinctive. The female has an overall greenish plumage which is more darkly colored above than below.
